On behalf of the ICABEEP Executive Committee, I am happy to report some recent news about IAREP-SABE-ICABEEP sponsored activities. The sponsorship of these activities was made possible due to the decision of IAREP and SABE to allocate money for such joint activities, and I hope that this fruitful cooperation will continue and the General Assemblies of IAREP and SABE will continue to provide annual funding for joint activities.

A couple of such jointly-sponsored workshops have been organized recently. ## ***Greenwich gives the lead on youth unemployment***

### ***Youth Worklessness: Bridging Academic Research and Policy Practice***

On Friday 23 March 2012, The University of Greenwich, Business School hosted a workshop on Youth Worklessness. The workshop received funding from the University of Greenwich and the International Confederation for the Advancement of Behavioural Economics and Economic Psychology (ICABEEP). It brought together academic and policy practitioners to shed light on the youth labor market dynamics, and to integrate different theoretical perspectives, and policy maker views on new labour market interventions for young people.

The workshop was organized by a research team from the University of Greenwich, International Business and Economics Department, working on Youth Worklessness. The team, Dr Riccardo De Vita, Dr Gabriella Cagliesi and Dr Denise Hawkes, proposed a new way of thinking at youth unemployment based on Policy Nudges that can motivate young people to make changes. These policy nudges should utilize the fact that young people respond better to reward than to punishment, and hence motivation should come through positive feedback and to help young people to recognize openings as opportunities instead of threats, especially when they seek work in a Jobcentre. These conclusions were derived by applying a new multidisciplinary approach developed by the team in devising a detailed pilot survey of University of Greenwich students, unemployed young people in Woolwich Jobcentre and youth club members at Downham, near Bromley. The pilot study suggested that different types of young, unemployed people had different traits, that reward was a stronger motivation than shaming them, and that economic and social factors could affect young people's attitude and willingness to change. The pronounced differences among young unemployed imply that young people may need more tailored programmes that are better devised to not leaving behind the difficult-to-place candidates, and to improving employability skills and vocational skills. Policies with more local rather than national focus could be beneficial.

Respondents to the survey indicated that personal beliefs seem more important than friends' advices and opinions suggesting that young people may respond better to individualization and flexibility in policies (rather than one-size-fits-all approach) which can inspire an aptitude to work as a personal belief, and be offered effective training and personal support. Because young people seem to have less fear of regrets, less ingrained negativity dominance, and show to be less anchored to the status quo and less reluctant to changes they may respond positively to a type of incentive that instils and promotes the value of making changes and to take up jobs. Young people can be encouraged and helped to generate weak ties in their social network capital so to enhance and exploit flows of information about job market conditions and opportunities.

Other speakers at the workshop included: Nick Raynsford M.P. for Greenwich and Woolwich who discussed key issues from the political perspective. Ingrid Schoon, Institute of Education, University of London who presented her work on Youth Transitions; Jonathan Wadsworth, Royal Holloway, University of London who presented his work on "The UK Youth Labour Market" ; Ivana Pais, Catholic University of Sacred Heart, Italy who spoke about "Youth and social capital: the role of online social networks"; Jayne Deeley, Head of Policy and

Programmes, Greenwich Council who discussed “Greenwich Council Approach to Youth Worklessness” and Emma Jarnell, Borough Partnership Manager, Job Centre Woolwich who discussed “Get Britain Working Measures.”

## ***The Bay Area Behavioral and Experimental Economics Workshop***

The Bay Area Behavioral and Experimental Economics Workshop was held on May 4th and 5th, 2012, at Santa Clara University (SCU). The goal of the two-day workshop was to create a welcoming scholarly environment in which behavioral and experimental economists from the Bay Area and beyond could share their research and ideas. 80 scholars participated in the workshop and 56 presented their research. Scholars came from Bay Area institutions (including Berkeley, Davis, Santa Clara University, Santa Cruz, Stanford, and Yahoo! Research) as well as many other institutions (including Cornell, NY Fed, UC – San Diego, and University of Virginia). There were seven parallel sessions, six plenary speakers (including Charles Holt, John Morgan, Muriel Nederle, John Reilly, Hersh Shefrin, and Meir Statman), and a workshop dinner. The workshop would not have been possible without the generous support of the International Association for Research in Economic Psychology (IAREP), the Society for the Advancement of Behavioral Economics (SABE), the International Confederation for the Advancement of Behavioral Economics and Economic Psychology (ICABEEP), the SCU Department of Economics, the Leavey School of Business at SCU, and the Office of the Associate Provost for Research and Faculty Affairs at SCU. Our thanks go out to these funders as well as to the scientific committee (including Alessandra Cassar, Dan Friedman, John Ifcher, Linda Kamas, Hersh Shefrin, Charles Sprenger, Meir Statman, and Homa Zarghamee). Next year's workshop is already in the works. It will likely take place around the same time (first weekend of May). The location is TBD.

## ***New Behavioral Economics and Judgment and Decision Making Departments in Management Science***

Management Science is pleased to announce the creation of two new departments, one on Behavioral Economics and the other in Judgment and Decision Making. Both departments extend the already broad span of research published in Management Science. The Department Editors are Uri Gneezy (University of California at San Diego), Teck-Hua Ho (University of California at Berkeley) and John List (University of Chicago) for Behavioral Economics and Yuval Rottenstreich (New York University) for Judgment and Decision Making.

The Behavioral Economics Department will publish original research broadly related to behavioral economics. They welcome laboratory experiments, field studies, and empirical and theoretical papers. The goal of this department is to promote research on incentives and behavior in domains such as markets, groups, and individual decision making. In the cross-disciplinary tradition of Management Science, they encourage research that draws ideas from multiple disciplines including economics, psychology, sociology, and statistics to provide novel insights on behavioral economics.

The Judgment and Decision Making department seeks empirical papers that investigate the beliefs and preferences of individuals and small groups. The department is especially interested in analyses that draw on psychological accounts of beliefs and preferences. Relevant psychological accounts may implicate perceptual, cognitive, affective, or social factors. Paper topics should clearly connect to real-world managerial decisions. Specific topics of interest include but are certainly not limited to: prediction; assessments of confidence; perceptions of randomness; judgments of covariation and causation; hypothesis testing; counterfactual reasoning; optimism and pessimism; risk perception; choice under uncertainty; intertemporal choice; self-control and self-regulation; resolution of tradeoffs or conflicting objectives; the evaluation of outcomes and decisions; reference points; debiasing; well-being; small group dynamics; negotiation and strategic interaction; power and status; morality, fairness, ethics, and justice; and considerations of rationality.
